Bringing Warmth This Winter

As winter's chill set in, a heartwarming act of kindness reached 80 households across Taranaki, thanks to a collaborative effort between the Fonterra Taranaki Doing Good Together committee and local Lions Clubs.

The idea, first launched by Fonterra's Southland Doing Good Together committee last year, was picked up and adapted for Taranaki with support from Lions Clubs in Kaponga, Opunake, Stratford, Eltham and Hawera. Their strong local networks ensured the food boxes reached those most in need.

Each package included basic food items such as meat, potatoes, soup, tea, coffee and dairy products, generously donated by the Fonterra Taranaki Doing Good Together committee. Eltham Lions took the lead in local deliveries, with Jenny even loading up her car to make sure every box reached its destination.

When asked how recipients were identified, Janine explained that there's no formal application process, "we simply rely on local knowledge and community connections to identify who might appreciate the care package."

This marks the second year of the initiative. Fonterra has confirmed that if the need continues, they will look to do it again next winter.

A fresh and exciting addition is coming to Eltham, located in the former laundromat - Kanto Corner Collections, a store dedicated to trading cards, board games, pop culture collectibles, and gaming.

Run by local couple Sheldon Rennie and Angel Viola-Rennie, Kanto Corner Collections offers a wide variety of trading cards, board games, plush toys, Funko Pops, and anime figurines, a treasure trove for collectors, gamers, and fans alike.

Beyond shopping, the store features a dedicated gaming area with four tables, where visitors can sit down and play board games and trading card games (TCGs) together. The space is designed to encourage social interaction, community building, and shared enjoyment of tabletop and card games.

The shop will also include a PS5 and Nintendo Switch gaming area, giving customers a chance to enjoy their favourite video games in a relaxed and friendly setting.

Another standout feature is the 70-inch screen in the shopfront window, used to promote local businesses, events, and community updates. 20-second advertisements start at \$10 per week, offering a visible way to get the word out, all while supporting a local hobby shop.

Kanto Corner Collections officially opens on Saturday, 12 July, and welcomes everyone to stop by, explore the range, and enjoy a space built for creativity, connection, and fun.

Uhlenberg Haulage Expands to the South Island

Congratulations to Uhlenberg Haulage on their latest milestone - expanding operations into the South Island! With new trucks now based in both Christchurch and Dunedin, their iconic bright green fleet now covers the entire country, delivering from Kaitaia in the Far North to the Bluff Aluminium Smelter in the deep south.



This exciting growth reflects decades of steady progress by the family-owned business.

Founded 59 years ago and proudly based on Bridge Street in Eltham, Uhlenberg Haulage has been owned and operated by two generations of the Uhlenberg family. Today, they employ a team of 50 and haul a wide range of commodities, from fertiliser and aggregate supplies for the rural community to refrigerated export beef from the local ANZCO Foods plant.

Before expanding south, Uhlenberg's had trucks based in Waikato, New Plymouth, Manawatu, and of course, their main depot on Bridge Street in Eltham. The recent South Island expansion marks a new chapter, enabling weekly deliveries nationwide - from Kaitaia in Northland to Gisborne on the East Coast, and now all the way to Bluff in the far south.

Uhlenberg Haulage has been a strong supporter of the Eltham community and a proud member of the Eltham Business & Professional Association for many decades. Their continued growth is a source of pride for our town, and we look forward to seeing where the road takes them next.

Floodwaters Rise Across Eltham After Days of Relentless Rain

Over the past week, Eltham was hit with days of heavy, persistent rain and thunderstorms, leading to rising creeks, surface flooding, and overflowing drains throughout the town.

Bridge Park Disappears Beneath the Water

At Bridge Park, floodwaters surged over the banks and swallowed much of the lower park area. Julee Edwards shared photos and videos, writing: "Never seen it this high... picnic table gone, bridge nearly, and the lake over the other side at the municipal building. It's well over the wall now and halfway up the grass." She later added: "There's no park left, just a big stream going up the steps and almost at that power box thingee, whatever it is."

Car Submerged at Bridge and Stanners Street



On the corner of Bridge and Stanners Streets, a deep pool of floodwater formed on an empty lot. A submerged Mitsubishi Outlander, was barely visible under the rising water. City council engineers were called in to pump the site, and the vehicle was eventually revealed as waters receded.

Axel the Dog Rescued from the Flood

Amid the chaos, a black dog named Axel was found stranded on a ledge above the flooded car. The Eltham Volunteer Fire Brigade responded quickly, rescued Axel, and contacted the pound. He has since been safely returned to his owner.

Wastewater Overflow Triggers Safety Alerts

The downpour also overwhelmed the Eltham Wastewater Treatment Plant, where stormwater and effluent caused the collapse of a riverside bank at the overflow pond.

About 70% of the pond's contents emptied into a tributary of the Mangawhero Stream, prompting a rapid response from the council and Taranaki Regional Council. Warning signs were placed at Castle Street Bridge and Ōhawe Beach, urging the public to avoid contact with

the water or collecting shellfish and plants until it is deemed safe.

A Community That Responds

Some residents experienced flooding in basements and around their homes, but quick action by the Eltham Volunteer Fire Brigade helped keep things under control.

With more rain expected, now's a good time to check your gutters, stay alert on the roads, and be ready for rising streams. Stay safe, Eltham.

Etham-Kaponga Community Board Funds Door Replacement

A small but meaningful upgrade is making a big difference at Eltham's Secondthreads Op Shop. Thanks to a recent grant from the Eltham-Kaponga Community Board, the shop has replaced its old door.

The team at Eltham Community Care Group, which runs the op shop and local food bank, shared their appreciation: "We are grateful for the support. It is an asset for the shop. The new door is easy to open, and customers have already commented on the improvement."

Manned entirely by a dedicated team of volunteers, the Secondthreads Op Shop

plays a vital role in the community. Providing affordable clothing and household goods, a portion of the shop's sales supports the Eltham Food Bank and other local community projects. The shop also welcomes donations of clothing and essentials, which help maintain its charitable efforts.

Over the past 3 years, the op shop has received additional support from the Taranaki Electricity Trust and Toi Foundation, enabling a series of upgrades that have improved the space for both volunteers and customers.

The Eltham-Kaponga Community Board noted that the organisation applied through the Local Discretionary Fund, which is open to non-profit and charitable groups looking to improve local facilities, services, or programmes.

"We chose to support this application because the need was clear, and we recognise the valuable role Eltham Community Care plays locally," Karen Cave shared. "Their work with the Food Bank and Secondhand Shop has a direct impact on many people in our community." In addition to supporting this local project, the Board has recently backed a variety of community initiatives, including:

- An outdoor AED cabinet in Kaponga for Taranaki Safe Trust
- A new tap at Taylor Park for dog owners
- New uniforms for the Eltham Netball Club
- A mural at Soldiers Park by Etown Youth Trust
- Support for the Eltham Civic ANZAC Service

They have also approved funding for district-wide organisations like Zeal, Horses Helping Humans, and the Rotokare Scenic Reserve Trust's ridgeline track remediation project.

Whether it's a new door, a mural, or a youth event, the Eltham-Kaponga Community Board's ongoing support helps strengthen and connect our local communities, one thoughtful grant at a time.


Exhibition at The Village Gallery - Alternatives: a repositioning

This month, The Village Gallery presents Alternatives: a repositioning, a reflective exhibition by Elizabeth Harrison.

Elizabeth's work reflects on our deep connection to nature, and what happens when that connection is lost. Using materials often gathered from her garden, she creates mixed media pieces that combine collage, printmaking, and carefully chosen words.

"Without nature there is no life, without life there is no nature," Elizabeth says, a quote that sums up the heart of this exhibition.

Many of her artworks have striking titles like The Burning Economy, Ko au te Whenua, and ...we were told there would be no more war.... They speak to themes of environmental change, human impact, and the fragile balance between life and the natural world. Her thoughtful use of language and symbolism gives each piece a story and a question for the viewer.

Elizabeth describes her process as "reconstruction, like participating in possibilities." She hopes visitors will not only enjoy the visual experience but also take a moment to consider their role in protecting the world we share.

The exhibition runs until 26 July, everyone is welcome. Entry is free.

New Basketball Court Coming to Soldiers Park

Exciting changes are underway at Soldiers Park, with work beginning on a brand-new 3x3 basketball court, a project sparked by the voices of Eltham's own youth.

The idea was first raised during community consultation sessions as part of Eltham's wider town revitalisation plan. Young people shared their hopes for more active, social spaces, and this new court is a direct result of those conversations.

Supported by the Eltham co-design group, the project reflects a shared commitment to creating inclusive spaces that support youth wellbeing and active lifestyles. Thanks to the support of Basketball New Zealand, the court will be fitted with a donated basketball hoop.

Construction is expected to begin around August or September, with completion set for just in time for summer fun.

This project is a great example of how local ideas can turn into real action, and how investing in youth benefits the whole community. Watch this space!
